

An extra mention to Noah who has earnt 50 PATH cards this year – his parents might expect a wee surprise in the mail!


NEWS FROM KĀKANO

BOARD NEWS

ACHIEVEMENT DATA: At the end of last term the Board reviewed student achievement data. Goals were set at the start of the year around Maths, Reading and Writing and it is pleasing to see that we have made progress in each of these areas. Reading has seen a 3% increase in students reading at or above expectation. Writing has seen a 6% increase and Maths has seen a 23% increase. This is pleasing for us and staff have identified next steps to ensure this increase is even more notable by the end of the school year.

KAHUI AKO: We are also pleased to share news that Kylie has won the shared position of Lead Principal for the Northern Wairoa Kahui Ako. This group is made up of 10 schools and 8 early learning centres across the Kaipara and Kylie will be leading the group alongside Curtis Gaylor from Dargaville Primary. Business as usual will continue for Kylie here at Arapohue but we know she will also work towards better outcomes for schools and students in the Kaipara which we too will benefit from.
