Thank you so much for a fabulous day on Tuesday! I really appreciate the effort and planning that went into making me feel welcome at Arapohue School. I enjoyed learning about your school and having the time to connect with you. Ngā mihi nui ki a koe.

The points I captured from my day are:

- Tikanga Māori is embedded in the school culture and routines. Students are supported to learn and develop as bicultural citizens within their community.
- Students demonstrate pride in their school.
- There is 'whānau feel' to the school which includes students, staff, parents...and visitors!
- The school values are woven through daily routines. Students know and speak about the school values.
- Students are provided with a broad range of opportunities to develop leadership skills, for example, leading roles in mihi whakatau and doing duty at break times.
- The school is clean, well maintained and welcoming.
- School routines are embedded to ensure students experience a sense of security, tūrangawaewae and pride.

And my final highlights would be around seeing our students push themselves outside of their comfort zones to give things a go. At sailing, camping, swimming sports, EPro8 and the Pahi Beach Trip I saw students rising to new challenges, overcoming fear and then enjoying their successes – what a privilege to see!

When it was the soccer tournament I got kicked and it hurt. I cried because I didn't like it. I kicked the ball hard into the goal. Gemma




