NEWS FROM KĀKANO

Soil Science in Kakano

We received our Soil Secrets science kit from The House of Science and enjoyed using the equipment to examine the soil around the school. We took samples from the vegetable garden, long jump area, playing field and adventure playground. After examining the samples (we saw lots of worms), we added water and detergent and left them to settle





over the weekend. On Monday we were able to see how much sand silt and clay was in each sample.

The children were able to demonstrate using sponges how water saturates the soil and how run off can cause soil to lose nutrients.

NEWS FROM RĀKAU

Rākau have had a productive term and we took a moment today to reflect on what we enjoyed the most this term and what was the biggest piece of learning. We then worked on putting our Writers Toolbox sentence styles into action as we recorded our 2 reflections.
